

NOTE: *Summer 2020 registration opens Tuesday, March 10th at 12:45 p.m. In order to register for a Summer 2020 course, please complete Page 1 and return to the Registrar's Office on or after March 10th at 12:45 p.m. See course descriptions for more information.*

If a student wishes to drop after the initial registration, s/he must drop the class before the posted add/drop deadline (Summer – Session 1: Tuesday, June 18, 2020; Summer – Session II: Tuesday, July 28, 2020). There are no refunds beyond this date.

A student who takes a summer course at the Law School and is notified during the summer term that he or she has been academically excluded may be allowed to complete the course for credit or may withdraw from the course. If an academically excluded student withdraws from a summer school course after the drop-add period is over, no refund for tuition is available. If you are taking a summer course with another school, including a study abroad course, the effect of your dismissal on your eligibility or receipt of academic credit is up to that school.

ABA RULE ON ONLINE COURSES: A law school may grant a student up to one-third of the credit hours required for the J.D. degree for distance education courses qualifying under this Standard. A law school may grant up to 10 of those credits during the first one-third of a student's program of legal education. Standard 206(e).

It is your obligation to ensure you do not exceed this amount. In calculating your total amount of credit from online courses, you should take into account any online course you have taken or might need to take as part of an accompanying course for your residency. Any credits taken in excess of the 28 credit hours will not count towards graduation. The number of online credit hours you have taken will be included on the Degree Audit that is available through OnTrack.

TUITION: Tuition costs for the 2020 summer session are charged per credit hour. Tuition is \$1,500 per credit hour. Students registered for the Law School Summer Session will receive a billing statement from the University. Payment in full or payment arrangements (e.g., confirmed financial aid) must be made by the payment due date on the billing statement to avoid cancellation of courses.

DROP/ADD DEADLINES: Students may add and/or drop classes through the posted add/drop deadline.

FINANCIAL AID: Students who are enrolled at least two (2) credit hours in either summer session are eligible to apply for financial aid for that session. **Financial Aid forms are located in the Registrar's Office.** If you have any questions regarding financial aid, please contact Lynette Lorenzetti at (336) 278-7640.

A component of the grade will be measured by participation (e.g., logging in and watching lectures, working textbook problems and answering review questions online, and submitting assignments). Students' participation will be monitored through the Moodle online course system and through students' submissions. Lack of consistent and timely participation in the course will result in a reduced grade in the course (detailed in syllabus). There will be at least one quiz and likely two, as well as a final exam. The quizzes will be submitted through Moodle (Elon's online course site), and the final exam will be through ExamSoft, so students do not have to be at the law school for the quizzes and exams. LAW757A First Amendment: Speech Professor Gaylord 3 credits

*This course surveys the Free Speech clause of the First Amendment, and considers both the theory underlying the clause and judicial interpretations of the extent of its protections. Potential topics include hate speech, political speech, freedom of association, indecency and obscenity, tort law and the First Amendment, access to the media, commercial speech, and copyright. We will pay particular attention to the application of free speech rules, doctrines, and values to emerging technologies. **This course is completely online, which allows students to listen to weekly lectures, do the course reading and work on weekly assignments on their own schedule (subject to submitting them by the weekly deadline). The course can also be taken from anywhere in the world with Internet access.***

LAW690A General Externship Staff 3 credits

The General Externship course is designed to provide opportunities for students to gain practical legal experience while working under the supervision of attorneys and judges. Students may earn 3 credits for 135 hours of qualifying work in the fall, winter or spring trimester or in the summer at a non-profit, government,

judicial or in-house counsel office. Also in the summer, students have the option of earning 4 credits for 180 hours of qualifying work. Qualifying work is substantial lawyering experience reasonably similar to the experience of a lawyer advising or representing a client or engaging in other lawyering tasks under approved direct attorney or judicial supervision. In addition to the minimum hours of supervised work, the General Externship requires students to participate in sessions with a faculty advisor and with other externs -- in person, by phone or online via WebEx or some other medium -- and submit reflective written work and time records. Students are eligible for the General Externship course after completing three trimesters at the law school. Students must have their placements approved by the Director of Residencies in order to register for the course. Applications, stating all requirements, are available on the website at <https://www.elon.edu/e/law/academics/experiences/externships.html>. **Students may not receive any compensation for their work in the Externship course. Professional Responsibility is a prerequisite if placement requires the Extern to be certified under the North Carolina State Bar Limited Practice Certificate Program. All placements must be pre-approved by the Externship Director. This externship will span across both Sessions I and II.**

LAW689A Leadership Fellows: Externship Staff 3 credits

The Leadership Fellows Externship is designed to provide opportunities for Leadership Fellows to gain practical legal experience while working under the supervision of a licensed attorney or judge who is either 1) working full-time in public service or 2) is in private practice but plays a leadership role in the Bar, in *pro bono* service, or in the community. Examples of qualifying placements are state or federal government law offices, including all levels of attorney general, prosecutorial and public defender offices; state and federal governmental agencies such as the Social Security Administration, EEOC, and EPA; law offices of past and present officeholders in local and state bar associations; and law offices of members of the N.C. Pro Bono Society. The course requires a minimum of 135 hours of work. Like in other Externship courses, students are also required to participate in group and individual meetings with a faculty advisor (electronically if necessary) and to engage in reflective learning through journal entries, goals memos and assessments. Registration is limited to Leadership Fellows. **Students may not receive any compensation for their work in the Externship course. Professional Responsibility is a prerequisite if placement requires the Extern to be certified under the North Carolina State Bar Limited Practice Certificate Program. This course will span across both Sessions I and II.**

LAW 843 Advanced Evidence Professor Friedland 2 credits

An online course that advances and deepens existing understandings of the rules governing the admission of evidence in civil and criminal cases. The course will be conducted both asynchronously and synchronously, using the problem method as its primary tool. The course includes simulation in the form of a final motion and trial to provide relevant context. While all of the evidence rules will be subject to discussion, the emphasis will be on several significant evidentiary domains, specifically relevance, character, impeachment and hearsay.

LAW732A Criminal Procedure

Professor Friedland

3 credits

The major constitutional restraints upon the criminal justice process are the focus of this course. Particular attention is given to the provisions of the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Amendments to the United States Constitution, including such specific issues as arrest, search and seizure, interrogations and confessions, the exclusionary rule, and the right to defense counsel. Overall consideration is given to the impact of Fourteenth Amendment Due Process requirements throughout state and federal criminal justice systems.

*This course is **completely online**, which allows students to listen to weekly lectures, do the course reading and work on weekly assignments on their own schedule (subject to submitting them by the weekly deadline). The course can also be taken from anywhere in the world with Internet access.*

2 credits

*A study of the professional obligations of attorneys imposed both by regulation and the noble traditions of the legal profession. The course will utilize hypothetical fact situations and problems likely faced by attorneys to reinforce the model rules and to develop a commitment to ethical decision-making in students. This course is **completely online**, which allows students to listen to weekly lectures, do the course reading and work on weekly assignments on their own schedule (subject to submitting them by the weekly deadline). The course can also be taken from anywhere in the world with Internet access. The course format is as follows: Each week, students will be assigned chapters in the textbook to read and work problems. Dean Woodlief posts recorded lectures online each week, as well as review problems. The work is largely at your own pace during the week, though students will need to have listened to the lectures and completed the*

problems by the weekly deadline. There are online chat forums/office hours twice each week, so students can connect with Dean Woodlief and ask any questions they may have about the material for the week. Dean Woodlief is available other times during the week by appointment. Regular, weekly participation is an important part of the learning process in this course and is also a proxy for attendance. A component of the grade will be measured by participation (e.g., logging in and watching lectures, working textbook problems and answering review questions online and submitting assignments). Students' participation will be monitored through the Moodle online course system and through students' submissions. Lack of consistent and timely participation in the course will result in a reduced grade in the course (detailed in syllabus). There will be at least one quiz and likely two, as well as a final exam. The quizzes will be submitted through Moodle (Elon's online course site), and the final exam will be through ExamSoft, so students do not have to be at the law school for the quizzes and exams. LAW795A Remedies Dean Woodlief 3 Credits

This course examines the various remedies available to claimants in civil litigation. It will cover damages, including compensatory, punitive and statutory damages. Equitable remedies such as injunctions and accountings will also be covered. Restitutionary remedies will also be addressed. This course is completely online, which allows students to listen to weekly lectures, do the course reading and work on weekly assignments on their own schedule (subject to submitting them by the weekly deadline). The course can also be taken from anywhere in the world with Internet access. The course format is as follows: Each week, students will be assigned chapters in the textbook to read and work problems. Dean Woodlief posts recorded lectures online each week, as well as review problems. The work is largely at your own pace during the week, though students will need to have listened to the lectures and completed the problems by the weekly deadline. There are online chat forums/office hours twice each week, so students can connect with Dean Woodlief and ask any questions they may have about the material for the week.
